### What Do Canine Genetic Tests Really Tell Us?

Come to the Educational Program presented by Dr. Bert Klei At Ringers Pet Dog Training on Sunday, April 23 (1:30 p.m.)

Over the last several years more genetic tests have become available for our dogs. What do they test? How do we use them? Are they for breeders only? Can non-breeders learn something from them?

In this lecture, I will take a look at the different tests that are currently available to dog owners. I plan to give you some of the genetic background on the test and how to interpret the results. Tests that we will take a look at are the familiar ones for von Willebrand factor and the tests for degenerative myelopathy and histiocytic sarcoma. We will also spend some time on what we can learn from the Embark and Best Breed tests. Finally, if time permits, we will take a look at two new genetic tests designed for early cancer detection (Nu.Q and Onco.K9). As always, I look forward to interacting with you and answering any genetics questions you might have.





## **AKC Farm Dog Certification**

Poco and I had an adventure in March with Julia Airgood and her Berner, Margo, at the B and D Creekside Activity Center in Latrobe, PA. We went to the Farm Dog Trial with many other dogs, all smaller than Poco. For some reason Poco seemed to feel it was her job to "greet" each dog that arrived after us with much barking of orders. I guess she was telling them the rules, but it was her first time at the event, so what she wanted to share I just don't know?

In advance, Poco and I had been practicing going in and out of a crate, jumping on a bail of straw and walking over odd surfaces at home. I hoped she was ready to spend time on a "farm" for a day and show she was an old hack. Fortunately, Julia went first with Margo to show us how the course went. They sailed through it; and Margo passed the first trial. Poco had to walk up to a gate and sit in a stay as I opened the gate and walked through. I then gave her the OK to go through the gate. The judge guided us through the course telling me what Poco needed to do. She had to walk past several "farm" tools, rake, shovel, and a ladder. They did not have the leaf blower turned on for her to walk past, which was fine with me! A person was standing there tapping two pieces of wood together, which didn't bother her a bit. She had to walk over a piece of plywood, a grate lying flat on the ground and a plastic tarp. No problem there. We had to walk past another dog; and she did great. Then on to meet the chickens ... don't worry they were protected in a crate. Poco said hello to the chickens politely, and sat while I "fed" the chickens. She hopped up on the bail of hay and sat down for the required time. Then the challenge! I was instructed to put her in a crate and walk away for 2 minutes. She is good about me leaving her, but you should have seen the crate they wanted me to put her in. Ridiculous!! I finally got her in and no problem with my leaving. We passed the first trial. Bravo Poco!!

In order to certify, the dogs have to go through the course with two different judges. If they pass both trials, they get their title. I was in a panic. I got Poco in that crate once, but there was no way a smart Berner was going to do that twice. The second judge was so nice when we came to that part of the trial. She saw our dilemma. She suggested holding Poco, while I went out of sight for the two minutes. That was awesome! I could barely contain myself! She did it! She passed the second trial and won her title. I'm so glad Julia encouraged us to give it a try. It is a nice test for basic obedience with some fun twists, as long as the crate is big enough for your dog!

The Club hopes to work on some of the requirements at one of our gatherings and perhaps some of you

## More Info on the AKC Farm Dog Certification Test

(The following information was taken from the AKC Performance Events section on www.akc.org.)



This test is open to all breed breeds. Your dog must be at least nine months of age and have an AKC number, recorded in the FSS Program, dogs with PAL numbers, or dogs enrolled in the AKC Canine Partners Program. Females in season may not enter.

This test involves your dog performing a series of 12 exercises that are typical for a farm environment such as being in close proximity to livestock (who are always penned to avoid any altercations). **There is no herding involved in this test.** Instead the goal is to assess his/her aptitude as a Working Farm Dog by exhibiting self control, confidence and trust with the owner or handler.

#### 1) Greet the Judge - Initial Dog Appraisal

Tests the ability of the dog to demonstrate patience and self-control while meeting a friendly stranger. The dog shall not pass if the dog jumps on the Judge, shows aggressiveness, excessive shyness, or is restrained by a tight lead.

#### 2) Perform a Walking Pattern around Farm Equipment and Passive Stranger

Tests the ability of a dog to demonstrate self-control, responsiveness to the handler, and the ability to adapt to an unfamiliar environment. The dog shall not pass if it is repeatedly on a tight lead, refuses to follow the handler, or shows fear or aggression to the passive stranger or unfamiliar objects.

#### 3) Jump on Hay/Straw Bale

Tests the ability of the dog to exhibit obedience to the handler, traverse varying terrain on farms, and athletic ability to be positioned as needed. The dog shall not pass if the dog fails after two attempts, to jump on the bale independently, with no assistance from the handler or if the dogs does not stay on the bale for a minimum of 10 seconds.

#### 4) Walk by Farm Animals

Tests the ability of the dog to demonstrate self-control, responsiveness to handler and ability not to disturb livestock. The dog shall not pass if the dog is repeatedly on a tight leash, refuses to follow the handler, or shows fear or aggression towards the livestock.

#### 5) Walk Over or Through Unusual Surfaces

Tests the dog's ability to walk on different surfaces and their willingness to accompany the handler on a loose lead to any places necessary to perform chores on a farm. The dog shall not pass if the dog refuses to calmly walk over a new surface after two attempts, is excessively fearful, requires a tight lead or demonstrates avoidance.

#### 6) Supervised Separation

Tests the ability of the dog to be temporarily confined while maintaining good manners while out of sight of handler. The dog shall not pass if the dog appears frantic or anxious or exhibits excessive barking.

#### 7) Pass Through a Gate

Tests ability of the dog to demonstrate self-control and basic obedience to not interfere with necessary tasks of the handler. The dog shall not pass if the dog does not hold a stay after two attempts, will not pass through the gate when instructed, or interferes with the handler operating the gate,

#### 8) Handler Feeds Livestock

Tests ability of the dog to be tied and remain calm while the handler performs the task of interacting with livestock. This establishes a foundation for the dog to be trusted around livestock. The dog shall not pass if the dog is frantic or anxious white tied, barks repeatedly, pulls excessively on lead or demonstrates aggression toward the livestock.

## AKC Farm Dog Certification Test (Cont'd.)



#### 9) Reaction to Another Dog

Tests the ability of the dog to exhibit self-control and acceptance of other, non-threatening, dogs working on the farm property. The dog shall not pass if the dog incessantly barks, pulls on lead or tries to make contact with the other dog, demonstrates fearfulness or aggression toward the other dog.

#### 10) Reaction to Noise Distraction

Tests the ability of the dog to demonstrate normal sensitivity to typical noises of everyday life on a farm. The dog shall not pass if the dog appears excessively fearful or demonstrates strong avoidance.

#### 11) Dog Approaches Livestock

Testing demonstrates that the dog can exhibit self-control when asked to approach, and possibly move livestock, while on lead. Also demonstrates the ability to be called away from livestock when instructed by the handler. The dog shall not pass if the dog appears excessively fearful or aggressive towards the livestock, is excessively pulling on lead, demonstrates strong avoidance or refuses to obediently leave the livestock or the outer enclosure when instructed.

#### 12) Physical Examination

Ability of the dog to exhibit patience, obedience, and trust in the handler while being touched and examined. The dog shall not pass if the dog fails to accept any part of the examination, exhibits annoyance, fear, or aggression towards the handler or will not stay in place during the exam.

If becoming certified as a Certified Farm Dog sounds like fun, start practicing. Obedience and self-control are essential qualities for a Working Farm Dog. But most of all, make training a fun and positive experience for both you and your dog. 
As reported by Heidi,:

## **Easy Cheesy Pup Bites**

#### Ingredients:

2 cups All-purpose Flour

1-1/4 cup Shredded Cheddar Cheese

1/4 tsp. Oregano Powder1/2 cup Vegetable Oil


4-5 Tbsp. Water

#### Recipe:

- Preheat over to 400 degrees
- Combine all ingredients except water
- Whisk in food processor until consistency of cornmeal
- Then, add water until mixture forms a ball
- Roll into 1/2" thickness and cut into shapes or use fun cookie cutters
- Bake on ungreased cookie sheets about 10 minutes (depending on size of shape)
- Cool and store in a refrigerator
